TAWA HISTORICAL SOCIETY AGM

The Tawa Historical Society does a great job in documenting the history of Tawa. It has produced 16 books on diverse aspects of Tawa's history in a 13 year period, and its members were the driving force behind the the construction of the Tawa Memorial which was opened in April.

It has worked with Wellington City Council over the years to see the following completed:

- series of plaques indicating the line of the Old Porirua Road through Tawa
- a plaque beneath the Memorial Oak outside Tawa School, on Oxford Street
- an information sign relating to Elsdon Best in Grasslees Reserve
- an illuminated heritage structure (the 'plinth') outside the Mervyn Kemp Library
- an information sign in the Tawa Cemetery
- decorative historical panels as part of the new Tawa Railway Station building



Please dig around for any spare beanies that would fit young children through to teens (or purchase or knit up some new ones) and drop them off at Tawa Rotary's collection point at ITM on the Main Road (southern end). One more child with a beanie is one more child that feels just that little bit warmer. And that little bit more loved.

RAIL SAFETY WEEK NEXT WEEK

Rail Safety Week is a nationwide campaign that raises awareness of safe behaviour around railway tracks. It is coordinated by KiwiRail in close partnership with a number of other agencies.

Tawa has been identified as an area where education and awareness about safe behaviour around railway level crossings is essential. TrackSafe NZ has been working closely with local



schools, KiwiRail, Transdev Wellington (who operate the passenger trains) and the Tawa Community Board to find ways to increase the levels of awareness of safety around the railway tracks in Tawa. There have been a number of close calls involving students from Tawa Intermediate – all related to the issue of the second train coming in quick succession after another train.

A number of senior students from Tawa School have been invited to the launch of Rail Safety Week at the Wellington Railway Station this coming Monday morning. They will be catching the 9.17am train into town from Tawa Station. Associate Transport Minister Hon Tim Macindoe will formally launch the week's events. Representatives from the Tawa Community Board will also be attending.

After the short ceremony and morning tea, students will be accompanied over to Parliament where the KiwiRail locomotive training simulator will be positioned. The simulator looks like a freight container but contains a classroom and cab, where new and experienced train drivers are tested on how they handle various situations and environments they face on the job. Students will be welcome to have a turn on the simulator, and take photos and video to share information with the wider school or their classroom peers.

How long have you lived in Tawa?

Apart from volunteering in the community, I enjoy spending time with friends and family, colouring, attending shows, baking and binge watching my latest favourite series on Netflix (currently working my way through Suits).

Favourite sports team and/or sports person?

I'm a cricket and rugby fan so All Blacks, Black Caps, Hurricanes and Wellington Firebirds.

Favourite musical group and/or individual singer?

I have quite varied musical tastes but particular favourites are Queen, Keith Urban (after I saw him play in Wellington last year) and Bon Jovi.

What is your favourite holiday destination in New Zealand?

I think we're incredibly lucky to have some amazing destinations in New Zealand – Taupo is a particular favourite. The mix of the mountains, the lake, the river is breathtaking, the people are great and there's so much to do and see! I've been lucky to spend a bit of time there and each time it surprises and amazes me.

What accomplishments/achievements in your life give you the most satisfaction/pride?

My Kiwibank Local Hero Award for my work with Tawa Linden Plunket and being part of the team getting a new Plunket building for our community.
