THE NEW TAWA COMMUNITY BOARD

Six candidates put their names forward for election to the Tawa Community Board in October, the same number as the places available, therefore there was no need for an election. Four of those six – Margaret Lucas, Graeme Hansen, Richard Herbert and Jack Marshall – were on the previous board.

Robyn Parkinson, one of the newly-elected board members, was instrumental in setting up the Tawa Community Garden in Oxford St and continues to play a lead role in the operation of the garden.

Richard Herbert has been elected chair of the community board and Margaret Lucas the deputy chair. Congratulations to all concerned!

The other 'newbie' was Jill Day who also stood as a candidate for Council in the Northern Ward. When she won a place as a new councillor, she automatically vacated her place on the community

board. That vacancy means a by-election will take place to find a sixth community board member. Publicity about that has now started. The by-election will take place in mid-February 2017.

TAWA COMMUNITY BOARD BY-ELECTION KEY DATES

Nominations open Thursday 24 November, with nomination forms and preliminary electoral rolls available at the Mervyn Kemp Library from Thursday.

Nominations can be received only by email or at the WCC City Service Centre. Nominations close Thursday 22 December at 12 noon.

If an election is required:

Voting will commence (including special voting) and start of postal delivery Thursday 26 January 2017. Special voting will be at the City Service Centre in Wakefield St.

A ballot box will be placed in the Mervyn Kemp Library for people to put their completed voting papers into.

Election day – Voting closes 12 noon Friday 17 February 2017. Official declaration by Thursday 23 February.

TAWA LIONS COMMUNITY CHRISTMAS PARADE

The parade will take place on Saturday afternoon, 3 December, departing Tawa School at 2pm and heading north on the Main Road towards Surrey St. Bring along the family to see a range of floats including community groups, bands, clowns, MG cars and of course Santa.



PROPOSED CHRISTMAS FESTIVAL CANCELLED

Unfortunately the organisers have had to cancel the proposed Tawa Christmas Festival which was scheduled to run straight after the Tawa Lions Christmas Parade on Saturday 3 December. Note that this does NOT affect the parade which will go ahead as planned.

The organisers were unable to secure the entertainment and carols service that would've been the centrepiece of the event. However they are committed to running this next year in conjunction with a range of other events. "We promise we'll have an amazing Christmas Festival in 2017!"

TAWA COLLEGE "COMMUNITY SERVICE"

TAWA COMMUNITY PATROL TAKES DELIVERY OF NEW PATROL CAR



After two years of fundraising for a replacement Patrol Car, the Tawa Community Patrol completed fitting out its new vehicle recently prior to it commencing operational patrolling.

Chairman of the Tawa Community Patrol Charitable Trust, Peter Lockery, said that funding came from a number of generous sponsors – including Porirua Community Trust, ANZ Staff Foundation, Pelorus Trust, Transpower

CommunityCare Fund, Tawa Community Board, Rotary and Lions Clubs and the general public via the Spark "Give-a-Little" programme. The new Honda HRV, resplendent in its bright livery, was formally commissioned im mid-November at the Tawa Community Centre when the Patrol hosted dignitaries including the Hon Peter Dunne, Minister of Internal Affairs, NZ Police Officials and City Councillors.

Established in 2008, the Tawa Community Patrol is the "eyes and ears" of the NZ Police. It has grown to 38 members, carrying out patrols of residential, business and industrial premises, schools and railway station car parks in the Tawa, Linden and Grenada North areas. Recently Police have referred prospective recruits to the Patrol to gain a 'taste' of patrolling, exercising observation skills and recording suspicious activity.

IMPORTANT MESSAGE FROM TRACKSAFE

Recently there have been a number of serious near misses between trains and students at Tawa level crossings.

Parents please remind your children of the need to take care when crossing the tracks and to take heed of the warning bells and flashing lights.

It's particularly important to note that trains can approach from both directions and therefore NOT to assume that the path is clear because one train



has passed through. We certainly don't want the serious near misses turning into anything worse!

THE TAWA MEMORIAL

Earlier this month the Tawa Historical Society received the good news that they have been granted all the funding needed to go ahead with building the Tawa Memorial at the northern end of Oxford Street in central Tawa, adjacent to Grasslees Reserve. A final grant of more than \$81,000 is being made from the Lottery Grants Board's Environment and Heritage fund.



This is the culmination of work which commenced as far back as 2008, and has involved co-operation with various groups. In particular the Tawa Historical Society is "..... grateful to the Tawa RSA and the Tawa Community Board who have been on much of this journey with us. We are grateful to our donors – originally the Mana Community Grants Foundation and the Tawa Community Board, and more recently the Linden Tennis Club, the Tawa Lions Club, the Tawa RSA Poppy Fund, and Gordon Mygind."

The Memorial will recognise the 13 Tawa men who have died in the service of country. The hope is to have it constructed in time to be dedicated and unveiled on 22 April 2017.

CHERRY BLOSSOM TREES IN TAWA PLAZA

A recent poll on Neighbourly related to "The possible removal of the cherry trees in Tawa Plaza".

The wording accompanying the poll read as follows: "As part of Council's upgrade of Tawa Plaza, there is a proposal to remove the cherry trees in the plaza. One suggestion has been to keep them but do away with the concrete surrounds. That probably won't be possible. Would you like to see the trees retained or if they need to be removed as part of improving the overall feel of the plaza, is that acceptable?"

272 people participated in the poll, with 61% preferring to "Keep the cherry trees".

It may be that Council officers come up with truly innovative designs for the plaza – transforming it into an appealing area worth spending time in – but that can only be accomplished with the removal of some or all of the trees. What then? We've been advised the officers will be coming back to us again shortly with their proposals and to further "sound out" the views of the community.

"Spring into Tawa", Tawa's annual street gala, took place mid-October, a bigger and better event than ever. The Main Road in the central shopping area was closed to accommodate a record number of stalls and other entertainment. Tawa was an independent borough from the 1950s through to 1989 when it was forcibly amalgamated with Wellington City. At that point the Tawa Community Board was set up to replace the Borough Council.
