BY-ELECTION FOR TAWA COMMUNITY BOARD

In case you're not aware, there is a vacant position on the Tawa Community Board which needs to be filled, which means that a by-election is taking place. The postal vote itself takes place in November and concludes on Saturday 21st of that month.

TAWA COMMUNITY MEETING

Local people are invited to a second community meeting at the Community Centre on Tuesday 13th October, 7.00-8.30pm, in regard to setting up a liaison group to have some say in how the Tawa Community Centre operates. There was an initial meeting at the very end of June. This is a follow-on from that. Whether you came to the first meeting or not, you're welcome at this one. We're wanting input from all sectors of the community - come and have your say!

TAWA HERITAGE SIGN

In last month's newsletter mention was made of the Tawa Heritage 'sign' (structure) which was going into place on the corner of the Main Road and Cambridge Street, just outside the library. The sign features four panels, lit at night, which tell of four

aspects of Tawa's history - its settlement, local government, the place of education, and Tawa's transport links. The structure was completed in the last week of August. It lasted about ten days before it was vandalised - one of the four glass panels was smashed and the inside wording damaged. It hasn't yet been replaced.

DISABLED PARKING SPACES

Don't think about even stopping temporarily in a disabled parking space - unless, of course, you have a mobility permit (the orange card visible in your front screen or on your dashboard). Obviously those parks are *not* there for able-bodied drivers. But you might not know that even *sitting* in your car in a disabled parking space can land you with a fine. I saw it happen outside Take Note Tawa a couple of days ago. I don't have any sympathy for people who park illegally in these parks, but the parking warden I had a friendly chat with told me they have a "no tolerance" policy towards able-bodied drivers who even *sit* in such a park for a minute or two.

A fine was issued to the young woman in the offending vehicle, even though she argued that she hadn't prevented any disabled driver from parking there. As the parking warden commented, she wasn't to know whether a disabled/elderly driver had seen their disabled parking space occupied and had driven on along the road. So there we have it - move your able-bodied body elsewhere!
