TAWA COMMUNITY GRANTS - CLOSING DATE EXTENDED

The Tawa Community Board has \$15,000 to be made available to worthy local causes. If your club or group, school or church is considering applying for a grant from the Tawa Community Board, you now have until Friday 18 February to forward your completed application to the Wellington City Council.

The Tawa Community Grants Fund is designed to assist voluntary projects in Tawa. Grants may be for charitable, educational, welfare, community development, cultural, recreational, sporting, activity development, equipment or training programmes. Grants may also be given to people representing New Zealand in a recognised sporting or cultural event.

To be eligible, applicants must:

- · be based in Tawa
- show that their project will directly benefit the Tawa community
- not have excess reserve funds
- meet all criteria on the Tawa Community Grants application form

WANT TO HELP TAWA YOUNG PEOPLE IMPROVE THEIR CYCLING?

A training course in cyclist skills is being run 14-18 February for adult Tawa residents who would like to volunteer with local police to help deliver cyclist skills training in Tawa schools. The aim of this initiative is to increase the numbers of adults and children in our community who cycle with confidence on our roads.

Newly trained volunteers will have the opportunity to assist with cyclist skills training for school students at Tawa Intermediate 21-25 February and 21-25 March, and in Redwood School 7-18 March. Other Tawa schools may be involved later.

TAWA WALKWAY PROJECT

Construction started in December on Duncan Street between Tawa Station and the College. The path is being pulled up and replaced by a 3m-wide path/walkway. (See the Tawa Community Board snippets further down). Next will be a brand new footpath along Findlay Street. Wellington City Council has consultants doing topographical surveys from Willowbank to Duncan Street. From the surveys they will be able to lodge the resource consents they need. Council hopes to lodge the consent early this year for the Redwood Station to Duncan Street section. This will be the next piece of walkway constructed after Findlay Street.



The consultants are also doing some preliminary design work for the bridges.

After the community meeting held in November, and the meeting with the Tawa College Board of Trustees, Council submitted an application for a level crossing (between the College and Tawa Pool) to KiwiRail and this has just been approved. Council will now start designing how the level crossing will integrate with the land uses on either side.

NEW TRAIN TIMETABLE FOR TAWA

New timetables will be available on the MetLink website from Thursday of this week and at timetable outlets from early February. For example, the new times for Redwood to Wellington in the morning weekday peak between 6.30am and 8.00am will be 6.29am, 7.01, 7.18, 7.29, 7.36, 7.50 & 7.56. Definitely an improvement if you're wanting to catch the train between 6.50 and 7.30am! Previously there weren't any that stopped in Tawa in that particular time period.

NEW COMMUNITY POLICE BASE

There has been a delay with the appointment of the new community constable. An appeal is taking place which means that there won't be anyone officially starting in





Tawa at the end of January as previously advised. At the earliest it's likely to be the end of February.

TAWA COMMUNITY BOARD SNIPPETS

THE NEXT COMMUNITY BOARD MEETING IS THURSDAY 10.2.11

As there hasn't been a Board meeting since the last community newsletter, there isn't anything to report from a meeting that hasn't taken place (if you get the drift).

However, the Board hasn't been resting on its laurels. Here's something of what members of the Board have been involved in:

DUNCAN STREET

You may have noticed the recent roadworks in Duncan Street just south of Tawa College. This is to do with construction of the path for the Tawa Walkway project. The first stage is to widen the footpath in Duncan St - from about Tawa Station to opposite the College driveway - to a 3m walkway. For some of that stretch there isn't enough room off the roadway to make the walkway that wide. Consequently the new footpath/walkway is encroaching onto the road, which has resulted in the roadway being narrowed by 1.5m.

It seems that no-one locally knew that narrowing of Duncan St at this point was going to take place. And not everyone thinks it's a good idea, bearing in mind the 'diabolical' traffic situation that regularly arises with traffic at the end of each school day, particularly when it's wet and there are even more cars parked there than usual. Various bods including Tawa College representatives and Tawa Community Board members met with WCC traffic engineers on site last Wednesday (19 January) to review the situation. As a result, the Council did agree that narrowing of the road would stop well before the College, rather than the road being narrowed all the way up to the parking bay opposite the College.

As it is, there will be yellow lines in place to stop cars parking on the western side of the narrowed road (the side closest to the railway line). This will result in the loss of a number of parking spaces on that side of the road. However the Council contends that the narrowed road could actually improve the traffic situation at this point. Previously there was a gap of approx 4.5m for opposing traffic to get through if there were cars parked on both sides of the road. With the road having been narrowed and cars being able to park on only one side of the road, the gap for opposing traffic to get through will now become approx 5m. But that will still mean a schoolbus and the likes of an oncoming SUV (or even smaller) won't be able to pass at the same time.

We'll be watching with interest to see how things actually pan out when school starts again!

OTHER BITS & PIECES

- The Tawa Community Board has been trying for a number of weeks to get the street lights in Brasenose Place working again. They've already been fixed twice but only seem to last a few days before bombing out again, leaving most of the street in darkness. We're doing our best to get this finalised as soon as we possibly can.
- A sign between the new roundabouts at the southern entrance to Tawa will be in place one of these days indicating that both DressMart and the Tawa Village Shops are located up the road.
- Concerns about all-day parking in Rawson St (leading up to Linden Station) are being addressed by Community Board representatives and WCC traffic engineers.
- Other 'mundane' but necessary stuff like the state of various footpaths, removal of dead trees, water seepage, and parking restrictions have been dealt with in the past few weeks by the Board. You won't want the details so we won't give them.
