DEFIBRILLATORS IN TAWA

In our last newsletter we talked about the lifesaving device that is the defibrillator, and the need to have these units readily available in our community. When someone is having a cardiac arrest, a defibrillator will deliver a controlled electric shock to the heart, which stops the spasms and allows a return to normal contractions. Otherwise the cardiac arrest could well be fatal.

Defibrillators in Tawa are currently located at:

- Tawa Volunteer Fire Brigade - more than one
- Tawa Medical Centre
- Linden Medical Centre
- Tawa Pool
- Power Systems Consultants, Level 2, 210 Main Rd (just above Simon's Amcal Pharmacy)
- Mervyn Kemp Library
- Tawa Community Centre
- Dress-Smart




AN AUTHOR(ITY) ON TRAINS

This is Tawa Rotary's biggest local fundraising opportunity each year. Almost half the proceeds are directed to the Life Education Trust, the remainder to various groups including several in Tawa. \$18,400 was raised at last year's Book Fair.

NEW WORLD SUPERMARKET IN TAWA

Also in your letterbox you should have received information about the proposed Tawa New World supermarket.

The following press release has been sent to us from Foodstuffs. It probably repeats the information in the flyer, but in case you missed that, read on:

It's a New World for Tawa. A big new supermarket and shopping mall is on the way to add a vibrant and friendly place to shop in Tawa's town centre. Foodstuffs Wellington plans to redevelop the current supermarket in the block between Main Road and Oxford Street into a full-service New World Tawa supermarket which will open in mid-2012.

The lower North Island cooperative of owner-operated stores is telling Tawa, Grenada North and Takapu Valley residents all about the development with a newsletter placed in household letterboxes on Tuesday and Wednesday, 28 and 29 June.

"What's there right now has become too small to offer the quantity and quality of goods the growing community of Tawa needs," Foodstuffs Wellington Property Manager Ian Hutchison said. "We're spending \$12 million to fully upgrade the entire supermarket and adjacent mall complex inside and out and will increase the supermarket area by one third to 3,200 square metres. Work will start in November when the current supermarket is due to close."

The existing mall will be remodelled into several attractive tenancies, the final number depending on demand. Together with New World Tawa, the mall will be a great place to shop. The whole area will be more convenient and inviting for shoppers with an attractive new entrance and realigned pedestrian crossing. The present pedestrian walk-through will become part of the design of the building so people passing through will have a well-lit and safe right-of-way from one side to the other and easy access to the supermarket.


Mr Hutchison said the carpark would be made easier for motorists to use with an additional vehicle crossing on Oxford Street for "exit only".

New World will provide a free bus service for shoppers while the supermarket is being redeveloped. "While we're building, we will make it possible for people to do their grocery shopping with a regular free New World Shoppers' Bus starting in November. This will take shoppers from the mall to New World in Porirua and also to the New World Churton Park supermarket once it opens.

A freepost feedback form is included in the newsletter so shoppers can let Foodstuffs Wellington know how often they would use the bus, which days and which times of the day are the best for them to shop for their groceries. "We hope to receive plenty of responses by the end of July so we can work out a timetable that's as convenient for Tawa shoppers as possible," Mr Hutchison said.

Tawa shoppers with Fly Buys cards will receive Bonus Points offers designed specially for them while they shop at Porirua and Churton Park New Worlds. Instant Fly Buys cards will be available so shoppers can join up.


"We'll keep residents informed by newsletter as the supermarket and mall project progresses," Mr Hutchison said.

The Tawa Community Board has been liaising closely with Foodstuffs to ensure they are aware of Tawa residents' concerns in regard to our being without a supermarket for several months.

There has been talk of a "convenience store" being set up whilst the new supermarket is being constructed. A press release in that regard has now come through, as set out here:



Temporary mini New World will fill gap while supermarket being developed

A temporary 'mini' foodstore will be set up in Tawa Mall for residents to buy groceries locally while the New World supermarket is being developed nearby.

Vacant space in the mall will be used for the temporary store so residents are not left without a convenient place to shop, Foodstuffs Wellington Property Manager Ian Hutchison confirmed today.

"We will not gain access to the existing supermarket until November 30 this year when we will begin completely modernising and expanding the interior and exterior," Mr Hutchison said. "We are mindful of the gap that will be created with our upgrade work and will establish a temporary foodstore in the vacant Tawa Mall premises."

"This temporary store will open prior to the current supermarket closure and will carry a modest range of essential food needs. Details are still being finalised and we will include further information in our next newsletter delivered to households in and around Tawa."

Foodstuffs Wellington is also planning a New World Shoppers' Bus to run regularly between the mall and Porirua and Churton Park New Worlds. It is seeking feedback on shoppers' potential use of the bus with a freepost feedback form enclosed in its recent newsletter to Tawa, Grenada North & Takapu Valley households.

OPINION PIECE ON "COMMUNITY TOGETHERNESS" - please read!

The Dean of ChristChurch Cathedral, Peter Beck, has talked about the worst of times (like the earthquakes in Christchurch) bringing out the best in people. In this morning's newspaper All Black Dan Carter is quoted as saying, "If there can be any positive to come out of such a disaster, it's the fantastic sense of community which has built up." But that leads to the question: is a natural disaster a prerequisite for a community to really "pull together"?

The experts tell us that those communities that are connected and know their neighbours have a definite advantage in the event of a disaster. But I suspect that a number of us quite like the idea of "knowing our neighbours" without the threat of a disaster providing the incentive. There's nothing to stop "neighbours looking out for neighbours" even in good times. We're better off as a community when that does happen!

Ask people in Tawa what they like about this place, and a response along the lines of the "sense of community" is what you'll invariably get. And yet I think it's still possible in this community to not feel a sense of connectedness, to know hardly anyone else in the same neighbourhood.

When I lived in Christchurch in the early 90s I organised a Neighbourhood Support Group involving 15-20 households at our end of the street. We "got together" 3 or 4 times a year, as I recall. And I'll never forget one older gentleman telling me, "You've brought the street alive, Malcolm." I'm not sure that it was quite as exciting as that! However to my shame I've done nothing similar in my own street in the 15 years I've lived in Tawa. I think it's partly because the lounge in my house isn't nearly as big as the one in Christchurch was. Having said that, there's the end of our cul-de-sac where we could set up our barbecues on the street 2 or 3 times each summer if we wanted to! Maybe I'll work on that one, and hope the weather plays its part.

I know of a Neighbourhood Support Group in Linden that has just "kicked off again" recently. And there are a small number of streets in Tawa that hold their own street parties occasionally, perhaps in the run-up to Christmas. However the number of Neighbourhood Support Groups is definitely smaller than it once was. We're busy people and it takes people with get-up-and-go to set up such a group and keep it going.

I'm very interested in your feedback. Do you see merit in a Neighbourhood Support Group in your street, or even a once-a-year street party? Answering in the affirmative does not mean that we'll be asking you to organise it! I, and possibly others, are willing to put a lot of effort into setting up mechanisms to help create a greater sense of connectedness, etc, in the community of Tawa, but only if people are interested! And I'd really like to hear from those in streets which do already hold their own get-togethers, parties or whatever.
