SUBMISSION TO THE GWRC

The Tawa Community Board sent in a written submission to the Greater Wellington Regional Council's Long Term Plan earlier this month. This past Monday community board members Malcolm Sparrow and Robert Tredger spoke at the oral hearings.

The main points we covered were:

- support for greater co-operation between the various councils in the Wellington region and looking at what benefits might be obtained from some form of 'amalgamation'.
- a request for more 'park and ride' facilities at Tawa's railway stations. Some station carparks are overflowing, with no parking provision available for those wishing to catch the train any time after 9am. This issue does need to be addressed.
- support for the extension of pest control programmes.
- acceptance that the majority view in Tawa appears (reluctantly or otherwise) to be in favour of demolition of the current Tawa Railway Station building and replacement with a modern shelter. However we expressed concern that public opinion may have been steered in the direction of the lower cost option because people had been deterred by the alternative.

We suggested that the estimated cost and time involved in restoring Tawa station could be way off the mark - as it was with Kenepuru Station. Last August a figure of \$1m was bandied about as the expected cost of 'rectifying' that station. In the end the work that needing doing cost only \$320,000. We stressed that more accurate costings should be obtained by the Regional Council before a good decision could be made on Tawa Station.

MORE ON TAWA STATION

The Greater Wellington Regional Council will be discussing the fate of Tawa Railway Station at their meeting on Tuesday 29 May. We'll let you know when we hear anything further.

PROGRESS WITH TAWA POOL

There's a considerable amount of work yet to be done in renovating Tawa Pool. It may well be mostly earthquake strengthening at this stage, but it could still be a few months before the pool is open for business again.

Members of the community board (see the photo below) were given the opportunity last week to inspect progress for themselves. It's a huge undertaking, obviously far bigger than originally anticipated, but the end product will be a significantly improved version - fewer leaks, less earthquake-prone, etc. It's unfortunate that it's taking so long, but everyone is doing their best to see it completed. We should know soon when that will be.

NEW WORLD SHOPPERS' BUS SERVICE TO END

It's been confirmed that because of low patronage, the New World Shoppers' bus service will be ending shortly. The decision has been made by Foodstuffs who have been providing this service. The bus has been making around three return trips a day to Porirua or Churton Park, but often with no more than two or three people on board.

The operators of the Tawa Temporary Supermarket point out that most grocery items are available in their store anyway. If anyone has special requirements or needs assistance in some way, they are only too happy to help - call co-manager Nicole on 232 3831.

AFS INFORMATION EVENING



On a personal note

Our pup, who usually responds to the name of Abby, is now six months old. She's maturing little by little, and really is improving in doing what she's told.

In her younger days she went to "puppy preschool" classes for four weeks. That helped with our teaching her the basic commands like "sit, stay, come", etc. She's now going to a further six weeks of obedience classes which, amongst other things, help in terms of getting her to behave in a somewhat civilised fashion when she's being taken for a walk.

It wasn't so long ago that a 400-500m walk was about as much as I could handle. Okay, I readily admit I'm not always as patient with her as I should be. But it seemed pretty much impossible for this dog to walk in anything resembling a straight line.

A dog's sense of smell is supposedly 40 times stronger than a human's. That being the case, the big wide world must present an amazing array of aromas. Probably explains why, when being taken for a 'walk', she would follow her nose and dart all over the place. More than once she'd squeal because I'd accidentally trodden on her paw as she shot across in front of me.

Obedience classes are designed for the dog's owner to do the learning. The amount of information available online is also very useful. One thing that's really hit home in recent weeks is how Abby the Labrador can be 'bribed' to do anything in return for a minor treat. Whereas previously she wouldn't come if it didn't suit her, she almost always does now because there's almost always a reward in it for her. Hopefully I won't still be needing to bribe her in two years' time, but you never know!

Her walking has improved to the extent that I took her this past weekend for the first time on my regular Saturday morning stroll down to the BP station for a coffee – for me, not her. The excursion is 17 to 18 minutes each way. She still pulls on her lead all too often, but a treat in return for responding to 'Abby, heel' means walking her is considerably more pleasurable than it used to be. And always exciting for her no doubt, but still a lot of learning yet to be done.

In the photo at top right she's tethered to a tree whilst I was inside getting my Wild Bean coffee. I felt the need to constantly look outside to make sure she wasn't chewing her way through her lead. She's not beyond doing that. Fortunately she didn't on this occasion.

I still don't trust her being in an inside room different to the one I'm in. There's always something she can chew on if I'm not there to keep a check on things. A few days ago she was in the lounge when no-one else was. When I tracked her down she had a sock hanging out of her mouth. Within seconds we'd done a trade. She handed over my dear wife's sock without any fuss in return for a small bikkie. Unfortunately she must have snaffled the garment a few minutes earlier because a considerable chunk was missing by the time I retrieved it. Into the bin it went. The owner was none too pleased!

We don't have too many things go wrong these days because our being 'alert' has become second nature. However that didn't stop her chewing through the thin chord of a battery charger recently (thankfully it wasn't plugged in at the time), or her constantly chewing on the carpet in the back compartment of the station wagon in which we transport her.

She went with us to the beach last Sunday afternoon, to a spot with no-one else around. She enjoyed the water to a limited degree and we let her wander up to 50 metres away on the sand. The intention was to see how well she would respond when commanded to come from that distance. I'm pleased to report that instant obedience was the result, and was accordingly rewarded with a treat. As the online article says, what incentive is there for a dog to come if it means its fun is about to be curtailed? Reward it with a treat and let it go and enjoy itself some more (under watchful supervision, of course). We did, and both dog and owner were happy. And hopefully that will continue to be the case.
