TAWA COMMUNITY BOARD INFO

HANGING BASKETS HUNG

The Tawa Community Board had been working on the hanging baskets project for quite some time and, finally, on a recent Tuesday evening more than 50 were put into place one by one in the main shopping area on the eastern side of the Main Road in Tawa.

Thanks to board members Chris Reading and Cr Justin Lester who did all the hard work in organising the baskets, and Brian Frampton (ITM Tawa) who provided assistance in screwing in the hooks onto which they would be secured. There was a substantial amount of behind-the-scenes work like arranging funding, obtaining permission from the various owners of the buildings between Drummond's Pharmacy and the Library, as well as overseeing the installation of the irrigation system.

Seven locals uplifted 50+ hanging baskets from where they had been stored temporarily and hung them outside the Main Road shops last week. They look superb and add a real touch of class to our central shopping area. As teething problems with watering the plants are still being sorted, you may even be blessed with a drip (or more) of water if you walk immediately under the baskets in the immediate future!



TAWA PRIMARY SCHOOLS' CITIZENSHIP AWARDS

The second annual Tawa Primary Schools' Citizenship Awards ceremony was held by the Tawa Community Board last week. The awards recognise "true leadership, citizenship, contribution to school life, etc" at each of Tawa's six primary schools, plus the Intermediate.

The Mayor of Wellington, Celia Wade-Brown, presented each winning Year 6 (or Year 8) student with a small trophy, a laminated certificate, and a book voucher from *Take Note Tawa*. A wooden shield with the winner's name engraved on it was re-presented to the school principal or a staff representative. This is kept at the school and updated each year.

TAWA STATION

In case you didn't see the official Tawa Community Board newsletter which was delivered to most (if not all) households in Tawa last week, here's what was said about Tawa Station:

Demolition of the existing station building will start on Wednesday 26 December and there will be no trains on the Kapiti Line from then until Thursday 3 January 2013. During that period trains from Tawa Station will be replaced by buses leaving from Duncan St. The station will be closed for around four months.

A replacement structure along the lines of that shown in the diagram (at right) will be built. Work will also be carried out to the pedestrian overbridge overbridge. This may be closed for a couple of hours at a time on certain days. Contractors will be working with the schools to allow access when necessary for pupils.



Tawa Community Board has met with Greater Wellington Regional Council (GWRC) to look at options, for example finding alternative parking, and/or a shuttle bus during peak times to link to an adjacent station. In recent weeks community board members and historical society members have also had a number of discussions with GWRC regarding the art designs that will appear on 16 panels at the re-built station.

Further information will be distributed by GWRC as the re-build plans are confirmed.


Your ideas on how to improve the park are welcomed. The deadline for feedback is 5.00pm on Friday 14 December 2012.
