TAWA COMMUNITY BOARD INFO VARIOUS ISSUES ON THE GO

The role of the Tawa Community Board, amongst other things, is to act as a go-between between local people and the city council. On that basis we regularly get asked questions about local issues and/or receive suggestions in regard to making improvements in the community.

Here are a few issues we're currently dealing with:

PIKITANGA RESERVE

The suggestion has been made that trees should be planted (or artificial screening installed) to reduce the effects of the wind, particularly the southerly, sweeping through Pikitanga Reserve.

We have approached the Parks & Recreation people at the Council. It seems that trees for various projects are allocated many months, sometimes up to a year, in advance. They will know within a month or two what trees, if any, might be available in the short term.



Otherwise it could be some time before any improvements are made at this park.

PINE TREES AT WILLOWBANK

There will be very few local people who don't know that a considerable number of large pine trees were blown down at the southern end of Willowbank Park during the storm three weeks ago. Although the remaining trees were given an initial inspection, we've requested that they be checked again to ensure further ones are not likely to topple in the next high winds. If necessary, some or all of those still standing trees may need to be removed.

We're also endeavouring to find out when the trees that have already fallen are likely to be cleared to enable pedestrian access from Willowbank to Taylor Tce again.

LIGHTING ON THE PATHWAY

Those who walk the segment of the Tawa Valley Pathway – Ara Tawa between Redwood and Tawa Stations on a winter's evening will know that it can be rather dark along there. The question has been asked about some sort of lighting being installed. Apparently KiwiRail is very specific about "... no lighting being permitted within the rail corridor" which is where that particular section of the pathway is located.

There's a possibility that some sort of "low subdued lighting" might be the solution. However that's not likely to happen in the near future. The situation may be reviewed if enough concern is shown by members of the community to warrant doing so.

The Tawa Community Patrol has recently extended its operations at the request of Porirua Police and is now providing a daytime patrol during certain days of the week. Mal Fyfe and Trevor Ross are pictured this week undertaking a patrol in the central Tawa retail area.

The Police have identified "hot spots" in the area which are being targeted by the Patrol. These include railway station car parks, streets where storm damage has occurred, school proximities and the retail strips in Tawa and Linden. The Patrol acts as the "eyes and ears" of the Police and reports anything suspicious.
