

COURSES AT TAWA COLLEGE COMMUNITY EDUCATION

PARENTS AS DRIVING COACHES:

If you plan on teaching someone how to drive in the next year or plan to support them while they are out practising, then this course is a must.

The tutor has been involved in the development of the Defensive Driving programme and "trains the trainers". He has done extensive research in the way we learn to drive and the development of the teenage brain and how it affects the way they to learn to drive. Development of the adolescent brain is critical when it comes to learning to drive. International research confirms parents can play a significant role in shaping and influencing the executive functions required of adolescents when learning to drive a motor vehicle.

SPICER LANDFILL CONCERNS (SMELLS GETTING UP YOUR NOSE?)

A notice from Peter Keller, Porirua City Council's Solid Waste Manager:

"If people have concerns about Spicer Landfill, the best way to get them into Porirua City Council's system is to log a call with the council's call centre on 237 5089. This makes it official and requires a council officer to investigate. People can also call the Solid Waste Manager, Peter Keller, direct on 237 1477 or email him on pkeller@pcc.govt.nz.

We had our annual Community Liaison Group meeting on the 12 June 2013 and made a point of inviting everyone who had contacted us with a concern about odours over the last year. In the end only one resident turned up, but it was a good opportunity to get her views and inform her as to what is happening at Spicer.

I am trying to build communication with people who live in Tawa and have visited two households and spoken to two others who have complained in the last six months. Although there were more complaints than usual last year, I haven't had any recently."
