TWO OPPORTUNITIES TO MEET CANDIDATES

- The Tawa Residents' Association (aka the Ratepayers' Association) invites you to "Meet the Candidates" standing for the WCC Northern Ward and the Tawa Community Board. In the boardroom at the Tawa Community Centre this coming Thursday evening, 19 September at 7.30pm.

A GREAT DAY AT "SPRING INTO TAWA"

"Spring into Tawa" Market Day took place last Saturday morning. The sun shone, there was no wind and the punters came out in their droves. There were more than 60 stallholders including the likes of ones run by Tawa College students fundraising for their French trip next year.

In the past, certain community groups have informed us that "Spring into Tawa" is one of their best yearly fundraising opportunities. That's one of the main reasons we run the occasion, as well as simply providing the opportunity for local people to come together and enjoy themselves.

Thank you to all those who took part on the day and, at the risk of inadvertently missing someone out, to the following groups in particular: Tawa Volunteer Fire Brigade, the Police, WREMO (Emergency Management), Tawa Rugby Club representatives, the Red Hackle Pipe Band, local Morris Dancers and Tawa College ukelele players. And thanks to New World Tawa for making space available inside in the event of wet weather. Fortunately we didn't need to use it!



THE GRASSLEES RESERVE UPGRADE

This was received from the Wellington City Council on Friday 13 September:

"Here is an update on Grasslees Reserve upgrade. The work to finalise the landscape designs and bring the scope of works into budget has taken longer than planned. The tender documents for construction are due to go out in the next two weeks. It is expected that a contractor will be confirmed to start by late November, however we have decided that there will be less disturbance to park users if we wait until January 2014 to start the work. This work is funded by the Plimmer Bequest.

We will be able to send you detailed plans of the upgrade once they have gone to tender.

In the meantime you will be aware that Main Road has had fencing installed to ensure dogs are safe from the road. This fence line will be planted this spring.

The new toilet block has now been completed and the old block removed."

MORE ON THE FENCE

In the last newsletter we referred to the chainlink fence which has been constructed on the Main Road side of Grasslees Reserve. The opinion of some is that it's not especially attractive.

On the other side of the coin, a small amount of positive feedback has also been received. This from Jeanette & Mikey: *"I want to comment on your article about the fence in Grasslees Reserve. Just to say the fence line may not look attractive yet, but I think it is wonderful. I am now very happy to let my miniature poodle Mikey off for a run. It is an attractive, safe area for me, very accessible, and provides a great space for Mikey to chase a ball. Thank you to those responsible."*

At its most recent meeting the Tawa Community Board agreed to set aside up to \$1500 (from its small Discretionary Fund) to finance the planting of reasonable-size shrubs as soon as possible to provide some sort of camouflage for the fence.

FLOODING AT DUNCAN PARK

A few weeks back we ran an article featuring a couple of little dogs who were prevented from getting into the dog exercise area at Duncan Park because of flooding there.

We contacted the Wellington City Council about this, telling them that "The main cause of the problem is the two drains that were put in to let the water drain away are always clogged up with mud. Also the growth of grass and dirt at the sides of the path hinder the water getting to the drains. If these were sorted it would make a large difference. The path at this point is regularly used by people going to and from Linden Station, by walkers, joggers, dog owners, etc but unfortunately it is often a very wet slippery exercise."

On checking with the Council we've been advised that they requested a contractor to check the drains and unblock the sumps. We're awaiting confirmation that that has actually happened.

"RIVERS OF LIVING WATER"

On Sunday 22 September at 6.30pm the second block of six studies of the "Rivers of Living Water" series of Bible studies will commence at Tawa New Life Church, 236 Main Road, Tawa.


