PROGRESS WITH WILLOWBANK

On 25 September we received the following update courtesy of the Parks, Sport and Recreation section of the Wellington City Council.

"Below is an outline of where we are currently:

- The trees have been removed front site and the site is now safe.
- The bridge has been rebuilt
- We are working on a planting plan for the area. Unfortunately this won't be planted until next planting season, because we need to grow the plants ready for planting.

At the moment there is still a very large root ball and stump in the stream. The equipment

Downer had on site was too small to remove this from the stream. They will be transporting a larger excavator to the site to remove the root ball. This is the reason that the tracks and walkways have not been returned to a better state. We didn't want to repair them and then drive over the repairs with another machine.

We have stalled a little because we've asked Downer to move on to another job in Hillcroft Road, Horokiwi. We needed to make that area safe from badly damaged trees as a priority. Once they become available the crew and machine will be back to Willowbank to complete the job and reinstate the tracks."

QUAKE WORK AT THE LIBRARY

Work is starting early this month on earthquake strengthening the Mervyn Kemp Library. The project will include bracing the ceilings, and two internal columns will be removed to integrate the original and new parts of the library. To do this work, the library needs to be moved temporarily.

From Wednesday 2 October until early November the library will be based in Tawa Community Centre's boardroom at 5 Cambridge Street, almost next door.

On Monday 30 September the library was open reduced

hours to enable preparation for the move to the Community Centre where they're scheduled to re-open on Wednesday 2 October at the usual time. You can still use the after-hours book returns slot which will be cleared daily.

As the Community Centre is a smaller space, they can only take the most popular collections but you can still request items.

Rose Barker, the Council's Northern Libraries and Community Spaces Manager, says that the work is a great opportunity to improve the layout of the library. "Removing the columns means we can review the layout to make the best use of the space. We plan to move the children's area close to the windows on Cambridge Street to give more room and flexibility for children's programmes held at the library."

Tawa Scout group is situated in Coronation Park, Oxford Street, Tawa, which is an ideal location for



youth to learn and understand outdoor and indoor activities and skills. The group currently has 90 Youth and 19 Leaders, making it one of the largest within the Wellington Zone.

The 20th New Zealand Jamboree (NZ20) is being held in Feilding from 28th December 2013 to 6th January 2014. We have 21 Scouts & 6 Leaders attending from the Tawa Group. They have been busy over the past months fundraising, which hasn't been easy.

Recently the hall has been rewired. It was in desperate need of being done. Local firm **Sole** *Electrical* stepped in to help get the electrics back into shipshape order. A big BRAVO to Kevin and his team. Awesome job guys for making the hall a safer place for our community.

SCOUTS TAWA is alive and well, but we have been very much under-promoting ourselves. Now it's time to share the good news and invite youth and adults to join us – both girls and boys of all ages. Our ethos states that through adventure we challenge individuals so that they learn and experience new things that enrich their lives, and bring to life a world of adventure, creating incredible learning opportunities for all ages.

Scouting is for all young people aged 5 to 26 of every faith, ability and background. Adults are needed to support this and full training is provided ... and you get to experience much of the Adventure Plus with the children.

Scouting is broken into a number of sections based largely on school years. Most sections meet once per week during the school terms, plus some weekends out and about.

Keas – Years 1-3 experience nature, sharing and co-operation, games, stories, creative activities and meet usually for an hour a week. Like the real Kea they are active, cheeky and cheerful. Our Kea Club is on Thursdays at 5.30-6.30pm.

Cubs – Years 4-6 experience heaps of indoor and outdoor activities including camping, bush walks, cooking and the traditional skills of compass and knots are introduced. Our Cub Pack meets on Wednesdays at 6.45-8.15pm.

Scouts – Years 7-10 – action-packed, outdoors-based and doing much more of the planning and taking responsibility. Experiences go beyond the local area to include National schools, Jamborees, and Regattas. Experiences can be land, sea or air-based (some areas).

Tawa Scouts is on Tuesdays 7:00-9:00pm. Redwood Scouts is on Thursdays 7:00-9:00pm.

Venturers – Years 11 to 18 – they get to develop and choose their own activities as they work towards the Queen Scout award. It's all about developing further their self-confidence, vocational and leadership skills. Time varies depending on the planning needed. The Unit meets on a Monday 7-9pm.

Rovers – after leaving school many young people continue in Scouting in the Rover section aimed at Service, social and self-development activities.

Leaders – 18 years & over – a great way to have fun, comradeship and put back into the youth in your community. You don't have to have youth involved personally. Training is provided and NZQA-based certificates have also been introduced. Programmes for the younger sections are particularly developed by a team of experienced leaders nationally along a consistent theme for the term. This makes a superb tool for new and experienced leaders alike.

TAWA VALLEY PATHWAY LANDSCAPING CONTINUES

Last Sunday afternoon (29 September) a small working-bee group from the Tawa Anglican Church organised by Richard Herbert distributed a load of mulch around some 200 trees in Findlay Street, adjacent to a section of the new Tawa Valley Pathway. The mulch and the earlier trees planted in June were provided by the Wellington City Council. They form part of a larger plan to progressively – over the next few years – enhance the attractiveness of the Tawa Valley Pathway experience through the placement of additional landscaping shrubberies to which the local community has contributed some input.

This activity was also part of a larger range of activities undertaken by the Tawa-Linden Anglican Church that day for Service Sunday projects when members divided into groups for different community-based activities that included gardening, rubbish collection, craft making, and care giving.
